

ANGLICAN CARE (DIOCESE OF NEWCASTLE) ORDINANCE 2007

AN ORDINANCE to establish the governance provisions for the operation of Anglican Care.

BE IT THEREFORE Ordained by the Diocesan Council of the Diocese of Newcastle as follows:

BACKGROUND

- A. On 24 August 2006, Anglican Care was incorporated as a body corporate pursuant to the *Anglican Church of Australia (Bodies Corporate) Act 1938* (NSW) by the passing of the Anglican Care Incorporation Ordinance 2006.
- B. Anglican Care operates Diocesan homes for aged people and provides other social caring services for the aged within the Diocese.
- C. The assets, liabilities and obligations arising for the Body Corporate established under eCP Ordinance 2005 are now to be provided for under this Ordinance.

PART 1 – PRELIMINARY

1. Short Title

This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the ***Anglican Care Ordinance 2007***.

2. Type of Entity

Anglican Care is a not for profit entity which is established to be, and to continue as, a charity.

3. Definitions and Interpretation

3.1 In this Ordinance, unless there is something in the subject or context which is inconsistent:

ACNC	means the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.
ACNC Act	means the <i>Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012</i> .
ADI	has the same meaning as in the Banking Act 1959 (Commonwealth).
ASIC	means the Australian Securities and Investments Commission.
Auditor	means the auditor of the Diocese appointed in accordance with the Diocesan Council Ordinance 1929.

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Bishop	means the Bishop of Newcastle, in the absence of the Bishop it means the Commissary and, during any vacancy in the See, the Administrator of the Diocese.
Board	means the Board appointed pursuant to clause 18 below.
Board Member	means any person holding the position of a member of the Board for the time being.
Bodies Corporate Act	means the <i>Anglican Church of Australia (Bodies Corporate) Act 1938 (NSW)</i> .
Body Corporate	means Anglican Care
Business Day	means a day on which banks are open for business in Newcastle.
Chairperson	means the Chairperson of the Board appointed in accordance with clause Error! Reference source not found.
Church Trust Property Act	means the Anglican Church of Australia Trust Property Act 1917 (NSW).
Commissary	means the person appointed by the Bishop to act in his/her place when the Bishop is absent from the Diocese.
Committee	means a committee established in accordance with clause 22.1.
Corporation Secretary	means the officer appointed by the Board of the Newcastle Anglican Corporation to be the Corporation Secretary.
Designated Fund Ordinance	means the Designated Fund Ordinance 2015 passed by the Diocese under the Bodies Corporate Act and includes any amendments thereto or replacements thereof.
Diocesan Chief Executive	means the Diocesan Chief Executive of the Diocese
Diocesan Council	means the Diocesan Council of the Diocese or a committee of the Diocesan Council with the delegated authority of the Council (to the extent of that delegation).
Diocese	means the Anglican Diocese of Newcastle.
Executive Director	means any person appointed as an Executive Director in accordance with clause 39 of this Ordinance
Financial Year	means the financial year of Anglican Care ending on 30 June.
Finance Debt	means and includes any indebtedness or other liability (present or future, actual or contingent) relating to any financial accommodation including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) an advance or loan; b) drawing, accepting, endorsing, discounting, collecting or paying a bill of exchange, cheque or other negotiable instrument;

Head of Entity	means the person appointed by the Board to be the head of the relevant entity as defined in legislation relating to child protection, disability or aged care (with this definition also applying to the term Head of Agency where relevant) and for such other duties as the Board may determine
Member	means a Member of Anglican Care as described in clause 8.
NAC	means Newcastle Anglican Corporation.
Officer	means any person holding a designated position within the governance structure of the entity including the Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson or Diocesan Chief Executive.
Ordinance	means this ordinance as amended or supplemented from time to time by the Bishop.
Parish	means a parish, provisional district or experimental pastoral area of or in the Diocese.
Responsible Persons Ordinance	means the Diocese of Newcastle (Responsible Persons) Ordinance 2015 and includes any amendments thereto or replacements thereof.
Security	means any mortgage, charge, lien, pledge, general security agreement or any assignment, trust or other arrangement securing the performance or payment of any obligation. It includes a security interest under section 12 of the <i>Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth)</i>
Synod	means the Synod of the Diocese.
Trustees	means the Trustees of Church Property for the Diocese of Newcastle ABN 31 876 908 346, a body corporate pursuant to the <i>Anglican Church of Australia Trust Property Act 1917 (NSW)</i> .
Trust Property	means all or any part of any real or personal property of the Anglican Care within the meaning of the term "church trust"

3.2 In this Ordinance, unless there is something in the subject or context which is inconsistent:

- (a) the singular includes the plural and vice versa;
- (b) each gender includes the other gender;
- (c) the word "person" means a natural person and any partnership, association, body or entity whether incorporated or not;
- (d) the words "writing" and "written" include any other mode of representing or reproducing words, figures, drawings or symbols in a visible form;
- (e) where any word or phrase is defined, any other part of speech or other grammatical form of that word or phrase has a cognate meaning;
- (f) the words 'including', 'for example', or similar expressions mean that there may be more inclusions or examples than those mentioned after that expression, and a reference to any clause or schedule is to a clause or schedule of this Ordinance;
- (g) a reference to any statute, proclamation, rule, code, regulation or ordinance includes any amendment, consolidation, modification, re-enactment or reprint of it or any statute, proclamation, rule, code, regulation or ordinance replacing it.

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- (h) where reference in this Ordinance is made to the Bishop such reference should be interpreted as the Bishop exercising the powers of the Bishop of the Diocese.

3.3 Headings do not form part of or affect the construction or interpretation of this Ordinance.

PART 2 – OPERATIVE PART

4. Objects & Powers

4.1 The charitable objects for which Anglican Care is established are to provide benevolent relief to those suffering poverty or distress (such as sickness, disability, destitution, suffering, misfortune or helplessness) by:

- (a) promoting and conducting activities within Australia and particularly within the Diocese to care for the poor, aged and infirm and to relieve sickness, suffering, poverty, distress, misfortune, destitution and hopelessness; and
- (b) undertaking any other activities in furtherance of the above.

4.2 Anglican Care can only exercise the powers in section 6 of the Bodies Corporate Act to:

- (a) carry out the objects of Anglican Care set out in clause 4.1; and
- (b) do all things incidental or convenient in relation to the attainment of an object under clause 4.1.

5. Not-For-Profit

5.1 The income and property of Anglican Care will only be applied towards the promotion of the objects of Anglican Care set out in clause 4.1.

5.2 No income or assets of Anglican Care will be paid, transferred or distributed, directly or indirectly, by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise to any Member of Anglican Care. However, nothing in this Ordinance will prevent payment in good faith to a Member:

- (a) in return for any services rendered or goods supplied in the ordinary and usual course of business to Anglican Care;
- (b) of interest at a rate not exceeding current bank overdraft rates of interest for money lent to Anglican Care;
- (c) of reasonable and proper rent for premises leased by any Member to Anglican Care,

for carrying out Anglican Care's charitable purposes.

6. Variation of 2007 Ordinance

The provisions of this Ordinance replace the provisions of the 2007 Ordinance.

7. Amending this Ordinance

This Ordinance may only be amended in accordance with the Bodies Corporate Act, which as at the date of this Ordinance requires:

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- (a) the passing of an amending ordinance by the Synod or by any board, committee, council or body of persons exercising the delegated authority of the Synod
- (b) the assent of the Bishop;
- (c) the certification of that amending ordinance by the Bishop; and
- (d) a copy of the amending ordinance certified by the Bishop to be filed in the Office of the Registrar-General.

8. Membership

The Members of Anglican Care shall be the Board Members for the time being.

9. Entrance Fee and Subscription

There shall be no entrance fee, annual fee or subscription payable by the Members.

10. Dispute Resolution

The Bishop shall settle and determine any doubt or dispute arising in reference to any matter subject to this Ordinance and may from time to time make directions for remedying any breach, error or omission related to the administration of Anglican Care. Any determination or direction from the Bishop shall be final.

11. Annual General Meeting

- 11.1 A general meeting, called the annual general meeting, must be held at least once in every calendar year.
- 11.2 At each annual general meeting, the Board must present an annual report of Anglican Care's activities and an audited report of Anglican Care's finances.
- 11.3 Even if these items are not set out in the notice of meeting, the business of an annual general meeting may include:
 - (a) a review of Anglican Care's activities;
 - (b) a review of Anglican Care's finances; and
 - (c) any auditor's report.
- 11.4 All persons present at the meeting must be given a reasonable opportunity to ask questions or make comments about the management of Anglican Care.

12. Special General Meeting

- 12.1 The Board may, whenever it thinks fit, convene a special general meeting of Anglican Care.
- 12.2 The Bishop may direct the Board to convene a special general meeting.

13. Notice of General Meeting

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- 13.1 Notice of a general meeting must be given to:
- (a) each Board Member; and
 - (b) the auditor (if any).
- 13.2 Notice of a general meeting must be provided in writing at least 14 days before the meeting.
- 13.3 Notice of a general meeting must include:
- (a) the place, date and time for the meeting (and if the meeting is to be held in 2 or more places, the technology that will be used to facilitate this);
 - (b) the general nature of the meeting's business.
- 13.4 The accidental omission to give notice of any annual general meeting to or the non-receipt of notice of a meeting by any person entitled to receive notice will not invalidate the proceedings at or any resolution passed at the meeting.
- 13.5 Where any annual general meeting is cancelled or postponed or the venue for the same is changed:
- (a) the Board must endeavour to notify in writing each person entitled to receive notice of the meeting of the cancellation, the change of venue or the postponement of the meeting by any means permitted by this Ordinance and in the case of the postponement of a meeting, the new place, date and time for the meeting; and
 - (b) any accidental failure to notify in writing any person entitled to receive notice of the meeting or failure of a person to receive a written notice shall not affect the validity of the cancellation, the change of venue or the postponement of the meeting.
14. Right of Non-Members to attend a General Meeting
- The Bishop may invite any person who is not a Member to attend and/or address a general meeting.
15. Bishop to Chair General Meetings and to have Casting Vote
- 15.1 Where the Bishop is not present at a general meeting and has not appointed a delegate or the delegate is not present, the Deputy Chairperson of the NAC shall preside over the general meeting
- 15.2 In the case of an equality of votes whether on a show of hands or on a poll, the Chairperson (or any delegate appointed under clause 15.1) at which the show of hands is taken or at which the poll is demanded shall have a casting vote.

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16. Adjournment of General Meetings

- 16.1 The Chairperson (or any delegate appointed pursuant to clause 15.1) may adjourn a general meeting with the consent of the meeting to a time and place as determined by the Chairperson (or any delegate appointed pursuant to clause 15.1).
- 16.2 If the Chairperson or (or any delegate appointed pursuant to clause 15.1) are not present at the general meeting, the general meeting may be adjourned to a time and place agreed by the majority of Members in attendance at the meeting.
- 16.3 No business may be transacted at any adjourned general meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
- 16.4 A resolution passed at a meeting resumed after an adjournment is passed on the day it was passed.
- 16.5 It is not necessary to give any notice of an adjournment of a general meeting or of the business to be transacted at the adjourned meeting, except if the meeting is adjourned for 30 days or more in which case notice of the adjourned meeting must be given as in the case of an original meeting.

17. Reporting to the Synod

The Board shall submit the annual report presented in accordance with clause **11.2** to the next ordinary session of the Synod.

18. Board of NAC is also the Board of Anglican Care

- 18.1 The Board of Anglican Care shall comprise the Board members of NAC.
- 18.2 The Officers of the NAC shall be the Officers of Anglican Care.
- 18.3 Any change in the composition of the Board of the NAC shall also result in an identical change to the composition of the Board of Anglican Care.

19. When a Board Member stops being a Board Member

A Board Member of Anglican Care ceases to be a Board Member when that person ceases to be a Board Member of NAC, irrespective of the reason.

20. Negotiable Instruments

All cheques, promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange and other negotiable instruments and all receipts for money paid to Anglican Care must be signed, drawn, accepted, endorsed or otherwise executed as the case may be including all electronic transactions in accordance with the Designated Funds Ordinance.

21. Powers of Board Members

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21.1 Anglican Care is an entity subject to the control of the Diocesan Council.

The Board is responsible for the governance, management, and administration of the business of Anglican Care.

The Board is accountable to the Bishop, Synod and Diocesan Council for the corporate performance of Anglican Care.

The Board of Anglican Care must ensure that it undertakes its work in accordance with the mission, values and strategies of the Anglican Diocese of Newcastle. Its powers include, but are not limited, to:

- (a) evaluating, overseeing and approving policies and strategies for the provision of contemporary aged care within Australia and particularly within the area of the Diocese to ensure delivery of quality care in ways that are relevant to the needs of people;
- (b) evaluating, overseeing and approving strategic and development plans including improvements, additions, alterations and development of sites and facilities and the provision of services at all sites;
- (c) evaluating, overseeing and approving arrangements to acquire and vest in Anglican Care any property and to raise funds for completing acquisitions, capital extensions or works or for other purposes of the Board;
- (d) entering into arrangements for the provision of services to organisations at other sites not controlled by the Board;
- (e) appointing committees who shall be responsible to the Board and shall report to each meeting of the Board or as the Board may direct;
- (f) approving the investment of monies from time to time in institutions that are limited to investment in authorised Trustee Securities with capital (which may include short-term government securities, bank accepted bills and bank certificates of deposits), in accordance with the Designated Fund Ordinance 2015;
- (g) raising funds by appeal;
- (h) approving the payment of any reasonable and lawful licence fee or levy to the Diocese determined by the Diocesan Council;
- (i) overseeing the receipt, administration and provision of the investment of donations, gifts and legacies and to receive, administer and distribute income from such investments; and
- (j) doing all such things as are incidental or conducive to the exercise and performance of all or any of the powers and duties of the Board and carrying out the purposes of Anglican Care.

21.2 Pursuant to the Church Trust Property Act and as otherwise allowed by law Anglican Care is:

- (a) authorised to govern, manage and control all Trust Property in any manner in which it sees fit and to do all things incidental to such government, management and control; and
- (b) authorised to pool any Trust Property and all matters and things incidental to such pooling.

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- 21.3 Pursuant to the Church Trust Property Act, the Bodies Corporate Act and any other relevant law, it is expedient for Anglican Care to be authorised, empowered and directed and Anglican Care is so authorised, empowered and directed (as it deems appropriate) to:
- (a) borrow or otherwise raise moneys by such means and methods as Anglican Care determines are appropriate and without limitation incur any Finance Debt and enter into derivative and other related financial arrangements and transactions;
 - (b) provide any Security or Guarantee in favour of a third party (including any ADI) over all or any part of the Trust Property and any other assets it holds; and
 - (c) in the case of the enforcement of any right of any creditor, or default under any obligation, arising under or in connection with any Security or Guarantee provided by Anglican Care or Finance Debt incurred by Anglican Care, without limitation:
 - (i) to sell all or any part of the Trust Property and other assets whether subject to any Security or otherwise;
 - (ii) to apply all or any part of the Trust Property and other assets or any proceeds from any realisations of the Trust Property and other assets in full or partial satisfaction of any such Finance Debt or liability secured by any such Security or Guarantee; and
 - (iii) to be indemnified from all or any part of the Trust Property and any other assets it holds

22. Delegation of Board Members' Powers

- 22.1 The Board Members may delegate any of their powers and functions to a Committee of NAC, an individual Board Member, the Diocesan Chief Executive, an Executive Director or any person as they consider appropriate on such terms and conditions they consider appropriate and with such restrictions they consider expedient.
- 22.2 Powers conferred under this clause may be exercised concurrently with the powers of the Board in that regard and the Board may from time to time withdraw, revoke or vary all or any of such powers.
- 22.3 The delegation must be recorded in Anglican Care's record of meetings.

23. Committee of Board Members

- 23.1 Any powers the Board seeks to delegate to a committee shall be delegated to a Committee of NAC. \
- 23.2 Where any power is delegated to a Committee of NAC by the Board, the Board shall convey any directions or restrictions upon the delegation of the power.
- 23.3 The Committee of NAC to which any power is delegated under clause 23.1 shall conduct its business in accordance with the framework provided under clause 23 of the Newcastle Anglican Corporation Ordinance 2017 (as amended).

24. Payments to Board Members

- 24.1 The Board Members may, if the Members resolve by ordinary resolution, be paid as remuneration for their services such sum as the Diocesan Council determines.
- 24.2 Notwithstanding clause 5.2 above, Anglican Care may:

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- (a) pay a Board Member for any services rendered to Anglican Care in a professional or technical capacity, other than as a Board Member, if the amount is no more than a reasonable fee for the work done; or
 - (b) reimburse a Board Member for expenses properly incurred by the Board Member in connection with the affairs of Anglican Care.
- 24.3 Any payment made under clause 24.2 must be approved by another Board member and the CEO and reported to the Board at its next meeting.
- 24.4 Anglican Care shall pay premiums for insurance indemnifying Board Members, as allowed for by law and this Ordinance.
25. Conflicts of Interest
- 25.1 A Board Member must disclose the nature and extent of any actual or perceived material conflict of interest in a matter that is being considered at a Board meeting (or that is proposed in a Circular Resolution):
- (a) to the other Board Members; or
 - (b) if all of the Board Members have the same conflict of interest, at the next general meeting, or at an earlier time if reasonable to do so.
- 25.2 The disclosure of a conflict of interest by a Board Member must be recorded in the minutes of the meeting.
- 25.3 A general notice given to the Board by a Board Member that the Board Member is an officer or member of or otherwise interested in any specified corporation or firm stating the nature and the extent of the Board Member's interest in that corporation or firm shall, in relation to any matter involving Anglican Care and that corporation or firm after the giving of the notice, be a sufficient disclosure of the Board Member's interest, provided that the extent of the interest is no greater at the time of first consideration of the relevant matter by the Board than was stated in the notice.
- 25.4 Each Board Member who has a material personal interest in a matter that is being considered at a Board meeting must not, except as provided under clause 25.5:
- (a) be present at the meeting while the matter is being discussed; or
 - (b) vote on the matter.
- 25.5 A Board Member may still be present and vote if:
- (a) their interest arises because they are a Board Member of Anglican Care, and the other Board Members have the same interest;
 - (b) their interest relates to an insurance contract that insures, or would insure, the Board Member against liabilities that the Board Member incurs as a Board Member (see clause 45);
 - (c) their interest relates to a payment by Anglican Care under clause 44 (indemnity), or any contract relating to an indemnity allowed under this Ordinance; or

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- (d) the Board Members who do not have a material personal interest in the matter pass a resolution that:
 - (i) identifies the Board Member, the nature and extent of the Board Member's interest in the matter and how it relates to the affairs of Anglican Care; and
 - (ii) says that those Board Members are satisfied that the interest should not stop the Board Member from voting or being present.

26. Duties of Board Members

The Board Members must comply with their duties as Board Members under legislation and common law (judge-made law), and with the duties described in governance standard 5 of the regulations made under the ACNC Act which are:

- (a) to exercise their powers and discharge their duties with the degree of care and diligence that a reasonable individual would exercise if they were a Board Member of Anglican Care;
- (b) to act in good faith in the best interests of Anglican Care and to further the charitable purpose(s) of Anglican Care set out in clause 4.1;
- (c) not to misuse their position as a Board Member;
- (d) not to misuse information they gain in their role as a Board Member;
- (e) to disclose any perceived or actual material conflicts of interest in the manner set out in clause 25;
- (f) to ensure that the financial affairs of Anglican Care are managed responsibly; and
- (g) not to allow Anglican Care to operate whilst insolvent.

27. When the Board Meets

The Board may decide how often, where and when it meets, provided that it shall meet together not less than 8 times each calendar year (including the annual general meeting).

28. Calling Board Members

28.1 A Board meeting may be convened at any time by:

- (a) the Chairperson; or
- (b) 4 Board Members,

provided the concurrence of the Bishop is first obtained and then by providing three clear days' notice of the meeting to all Board Members.

28.2 Notice of a Board meeting may be communicated to those entitled to receive the Notice by electronic means.

29. Using Technology to hold Board Meetings

29.1 The Board Members may hold Board meetings by using any technology (such as video or teleconferencing) that is agreed to by all of the Board Members.

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- 29.2 The Board Members' agreement may be a standing one.
- 29.3 A Board Member may only withdraw their consent within a reasonable period before the meeting.
30. Quorum at Board Meetings
- 30.1 The quorum for a meeting of the Board is four members of the Board.
- 30.2 No business may be transacted at any Board meeting unless a quorum of Board Members is present at all times during the meeting.
- 30.3 Board Members who are personally present (or in conference in accordance with clause 29) form a quorum. A Board Member who is disqualified from voting on a matter pursuant to clause 25 shall be counted in the quorum despite that disqualification.
- 30.4 All resolutions of the Board Members passed at a Board meeting where a quorum is present but where notice of the meeting has not been given as required to each Board Member, or any act carried out pursuant to such resolution, shall, provided each Board Member to whom notice was not given subsequently agrees to waive the same, be valid as if notice of the meeting had been duly given to all Board Members.
31. Voting
- 31.1 A resolution of the Board must be passed by a majority of votes of the Board Members present at the meeting who vote on the resolution. A resolution passed by a majority of the votes cast by the Board Members will for all purposes be taken to be a determination of the Board.
- 31.2 Each Board Member shall have one vote.
- 31.3 In case of an equality of votes at a Board meeting, the Chairperson will be entitled to a casting vote in addition to a deliberative vote, which they may or may not choose to exercise.
32. Resolutions by Board Members
- 32.1 The Board may pass a resolution by way of a circular resolution without a Board meeting being held if all the Board Members entitled to vote on the resolution sign a document containing a statement that they are in favour of the resolution set out in the document. For this purpose, signatures can be contained in more than one document.
- 32.2 The resolution is passed when a majority of the Board Members sign the resolution.
- 32.3 A transmission, via whatever technological means, which is received by Anglican Care and which purports to have been signed by a Board Member shall for the purposes of this clause be taken to be in writing and signed by that Board Member at the time of the receipt of the transmission by Anglican Care in legible form.
- 32.4 Anglican Care may send a circular resolution by email to the Board Members and the Board Members may agree to the resolution by sending a reply email to that effect, including the text of the resolution in their reply.
33. Validation of Board Members
- All acts done:

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- (a) at any Board meeting; or
- (b) by any person acting as a Board Member,

shall, even if it is discovered afterwards that there was a defect in the appointment or continuance in office of any such Board Member or person or that they or any of them were disqualified or were not entitled to vote, be as valid as if every such person had been duly appointed or had continued in office and was duly qualified to be a Board Member and had been entitled to vote.

34. Minutes and Records

34.1 Anglican Care must make and keep the following records:

- (a) minutes of proceedings and resolutions of general meetings; and
- (b) a copy of a notice of each general meeting.

34.2 Anglican Care must make and keep the following records:

- (a) minutes of proceedings and resolutions of Board meetings (including meetings of any Committees); and
- (b) circular resolutions of Board Members.

34.3 To allow the Board Members to inspect Anglican Care's records, Anglican Care must give Board Members reasonable access to the records set out in clauses 34.1, 34.2 and 37.1.

34.4 The Board Members must ensure that minutes of a general meeting or a Board meeting are signed within a reasonable time after the meeting by:

- (a) the Bishop; or
- (b) any other person presiding over the meeting.

34.5 The Board Members must ensure that minutes of the passing of a circular resolution of Board Members are signed by the Chair within a reasonable time after the resolution is passed.

35. Execution of Documents

(a) Documents must be executed on behalf of Anglican Care in accordance with the Bodies Corporate Act.

(b) If a document is executed on behalf of Anglican Care:

- (i) using its common seal, the common seal may only be affixed in accordance with a resolution of the Board and in the presence of and attested to by the signatures of:
 - (A) 2 Board Members; and
 - (B) the Corporation Secretary or a person authorised in writing by the Corporation Secretary to sign on his/her behalf.
- (ii) pursuant to any applicable delegation, it must be executed in accordance with the terms of that delegation.

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36. Power of Attorney

The Board of Anglican Care may empower any person, either generally or in respect of any specified matters, as its attorney, to execute deeds or do any other matter on its behalf in any place whether inside or outside the State. A deed signed by such attorney on behalf of Anglican Care shall bind Anglican Care and have the same effect as if it were under its common seal.

37. Financial and Related Records

37.1 Anglican Care must make and keep written financial records that:

- (a) correctly record and explain its transactions and financial position and performance; and
- (b) enable true and fair financial statements to be prepared and to be audited.

37.2 Anglican Care must also keep written records that correctly record its operations.

37.3 Anglican Care must retain its records for at least 7 years.

37.4 The Board Members must take reasonable steps to ensure that Anglican Care's records are kept safe.

38. Board Members' access to documents

38.1 A Board Member has a right of access to the financial records of Anglican Care at all reasonable times.

38.2 If the Board Members agree, Anglican Care must give a Board Member or former Board Member access to:

- (a) certain documents, including documents provided for or available to the Board Members; and
- (b) any other documents referred to in those documents.

39. Management of Anglican Care and Head of Entity

The Board, with the concurrence of the Bishop, shall appoint a person to be responsible for the management and administration of the day to day operations of the Body Corporate and may, with the concurrence of the Bishop, delegate any powers or responsibilities to an Executive Director or some other person as determined and approved by the Board.

40. Inspections and Inquiries by the Bishop and Diocesan Council

40.1 The Board shall ensure that:

- (a) the Bishop and the Diocesan Council are kept informed of all key financial, strategic and risk matters associated with Anglican Care in such manner and with such frequency as the Bishop and Diocesan Council determine; and
- (b) any requests of the Bishop and the Diocesan Council are considered by the Board.

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40.2 The Diocesan Council may at any time and in such manner as it thinks fit:

- (a) direct an inspection of Anglican Care, its finances, its buildings and equipment; and/or
- (b) direct an inquiry into the operational and general affairs of Anglican Care.

41. By-Laws

41.1 The Board Members may pass a resolution to make by-laws to give effect to this Ordinance. By-laws may not be inconsistent with this Ordinance and, in the event of any inconsistency, the provisions of this Ordinance will prevail.

41.2 The Board Members must comply with by-laws as if they were part of this Ordinance.

42. When Notice is taken to be given

Written notice under this Ordinance may be:

- (a) delivered in person, or left at the recipient's address, and is taken to be given on the day it is delivered;
- (b) sent by post, and is taken to be given on the fifth Business Day after it is posted with the correct payment of postage costs;
- (c) sent by email, fax or other electronic method as agreed to by the recipient and is taken to be given on the Business Day after it is sent.

43. Winding Up

43.1 If any surplus remains following the winding up of Anglican Care, the surplus will not be paid to or distributed to the Members, but will be given or transferred to one or more corporation(s) or institution(s) which has:

- (a) charitable objects which are similar to the objects of Anglican Care as set out in clause 4.1;
- (b) a governing document which requires its income and property to be applied in promoting its objects;
- (c) is registered as a public benevolent institution (**PBI**) and endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office to be income tax exempt and to have deductible gift recipient (**DGR**) status; and
- (d) a governing document which prohibits it from paying or distributing its income and property amongst its members to an extent at least as great as imposed on Anglican Care by clause 5.

43.2 The identity of the corporation(s) or institution(s) is to be determined by the Bishop in writing at or before the time of dissolution and failing such determination being made, by application to the Supreme Court for determination.

43.3 In the event that Anglican Care ever has its endorsement as a DGR revoked, Anglican Care must transfer all remaining money received in respect of such gifts and contributions to an institution which meets the requirements set out at clause 43.1(a) to (d). The identity of the other institution or corporation is to be determined by the Bishop in writing.

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44. Indemnity

To the extent permitted by law every Board Member shall be indemnified out of the funds of Anglican Care against all costs, expenses and liabilities incurred as such a Board Member or employee (or former Board Member or employee). However, no such Board Member (or former Board Member) shall be indemnified out of the funds of Anglican Care under this clause unless:

- (a) it is in respect of a liability to another person (other than Anglican Care or a related body corporate to Anglican Care) where the liability to the other person does not arise out of conduct involving a lack of good faith; or
- (b) it is in respect of a liability for costs and expenses incurred:
 - (i) in defending proceedings, whether civil or criminal, in which judgment is given in favour of the Board Member (or former Board Member) or in which the Board Member (or former Board Member) is acquitted; or
 - (ii) in connection with an application, in relation to such proceedings, in which the court grants relief to the Board Member (or former Board Member).

45. Payment of Indemnity Policy Premium

45.1 To the extent permitted by law, Anglican Care may at the discretion of the Board enter into and pay a premium in respect of a policy of insurance insuring an Board Member (or former Board Member) of Anglican Care against any liability incurred by such person in that capacity (whether in respect of acts or omissions prior to or after the date of the issue of the policy or both) except for a liability arising out of conduct involving a wilful breach of duty in relation to Anglican Care.

45.2 The Board shall have the discretion to approve the terms and conditions of any such policy of insurance.

45.3 Where a Board Member (or former Board Member) has the benefit of an indemnity pursuant to an insurance policy in respect of his actions or omissions then Anglican Care shall not be required to indemnify the Board Member under clause 37 except to the extent that the indemnity affected by the insurance policy does not fully cover the persons liability.

46. Indemnity to Continue

The indemnity granted by Anglican Care, contained in clause 44, shall continue in full force and effect notwithstanding the deletion or modification of that clause, in respect of acts and omissions occurring prior to the date of the deletion or modification.
